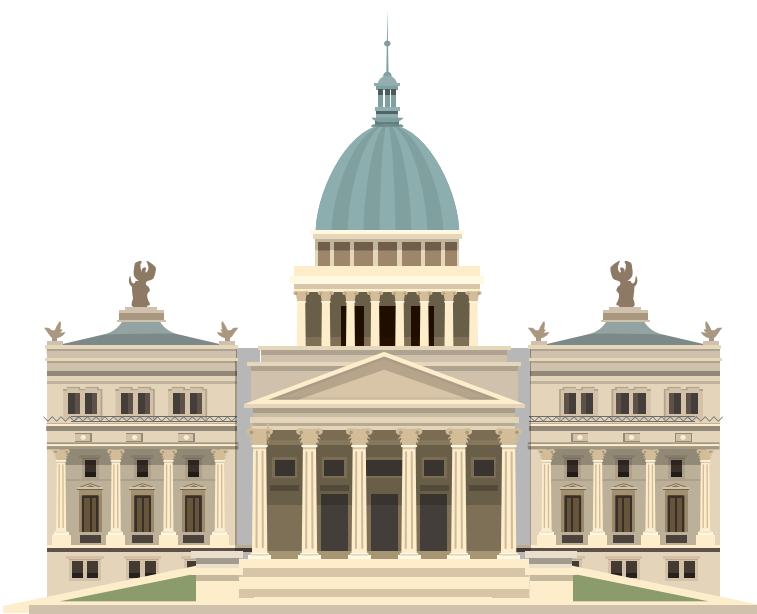

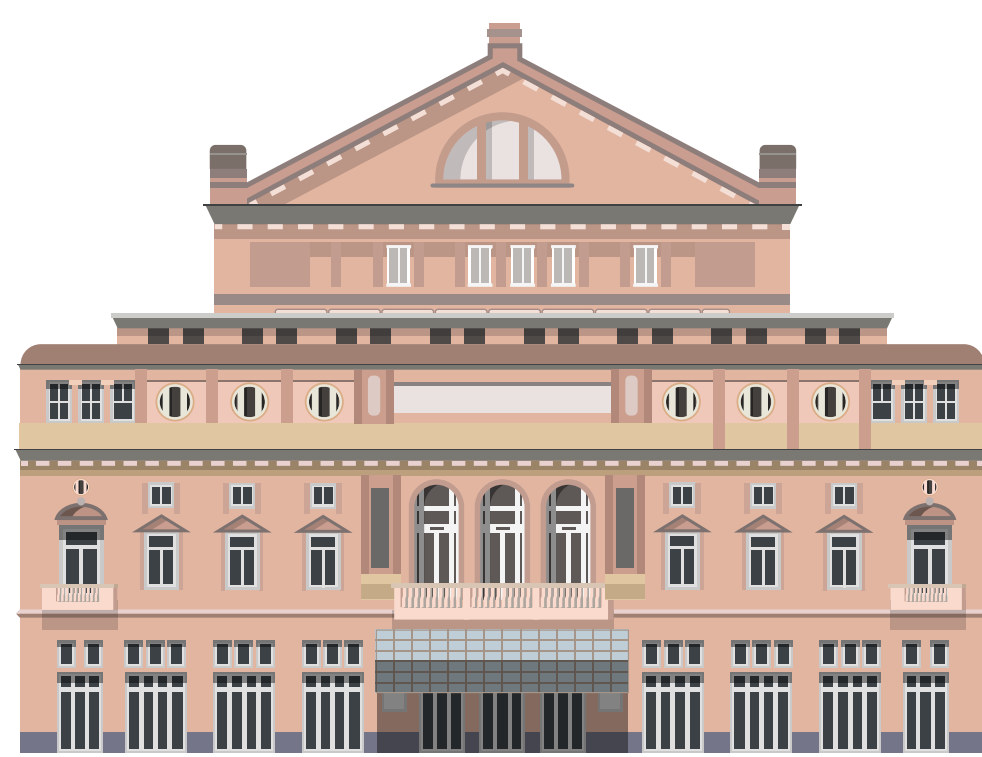
## BUENOS AIRES

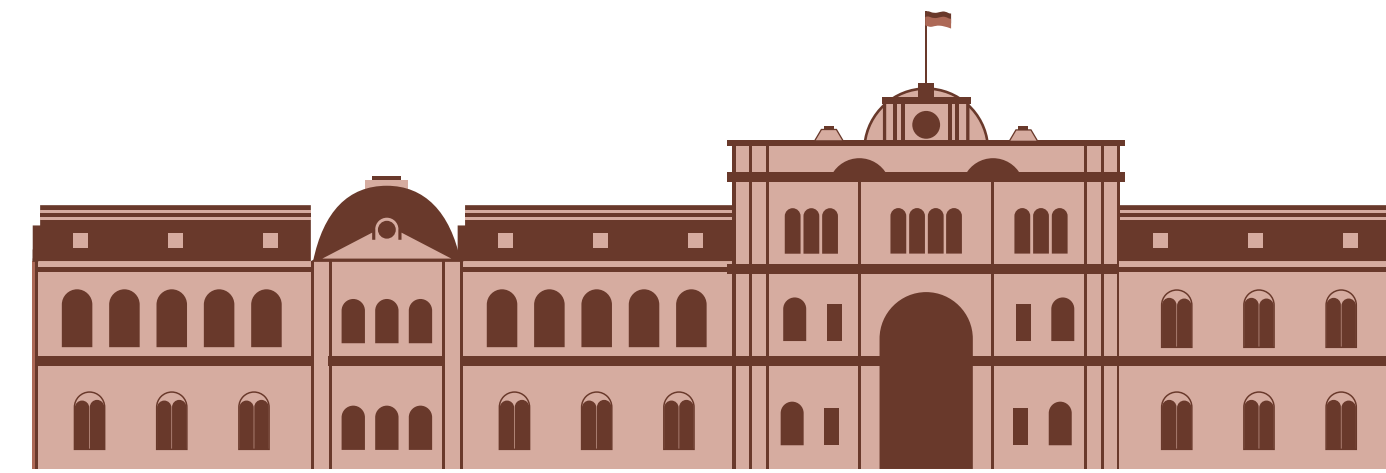
## TEATRO COLON

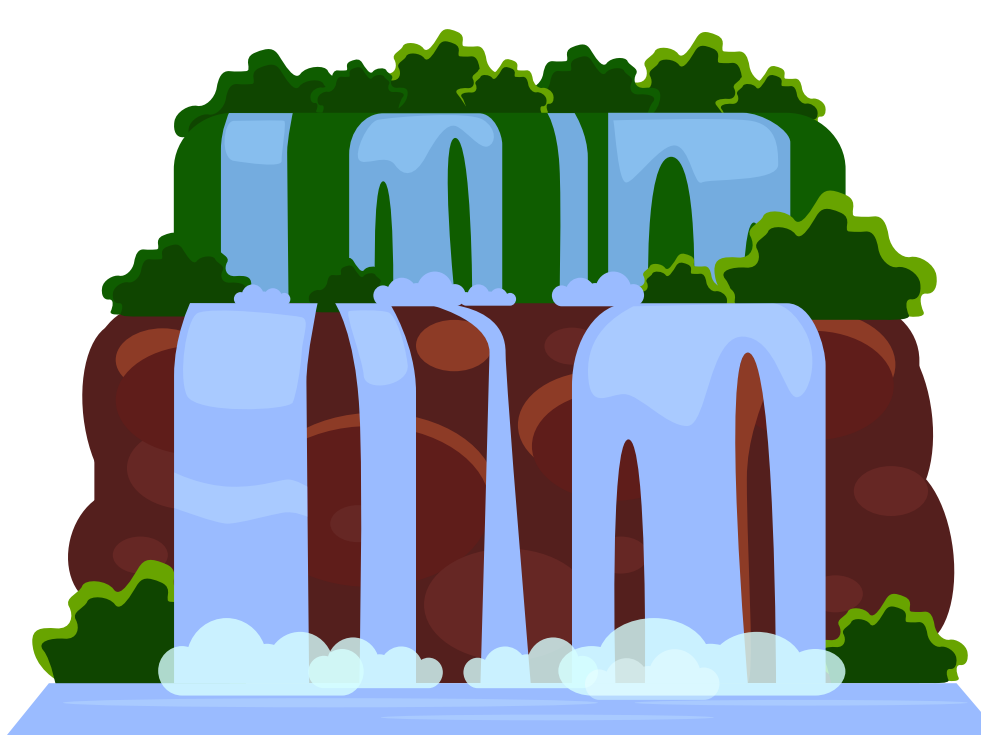
## PLAZA DE MAYO

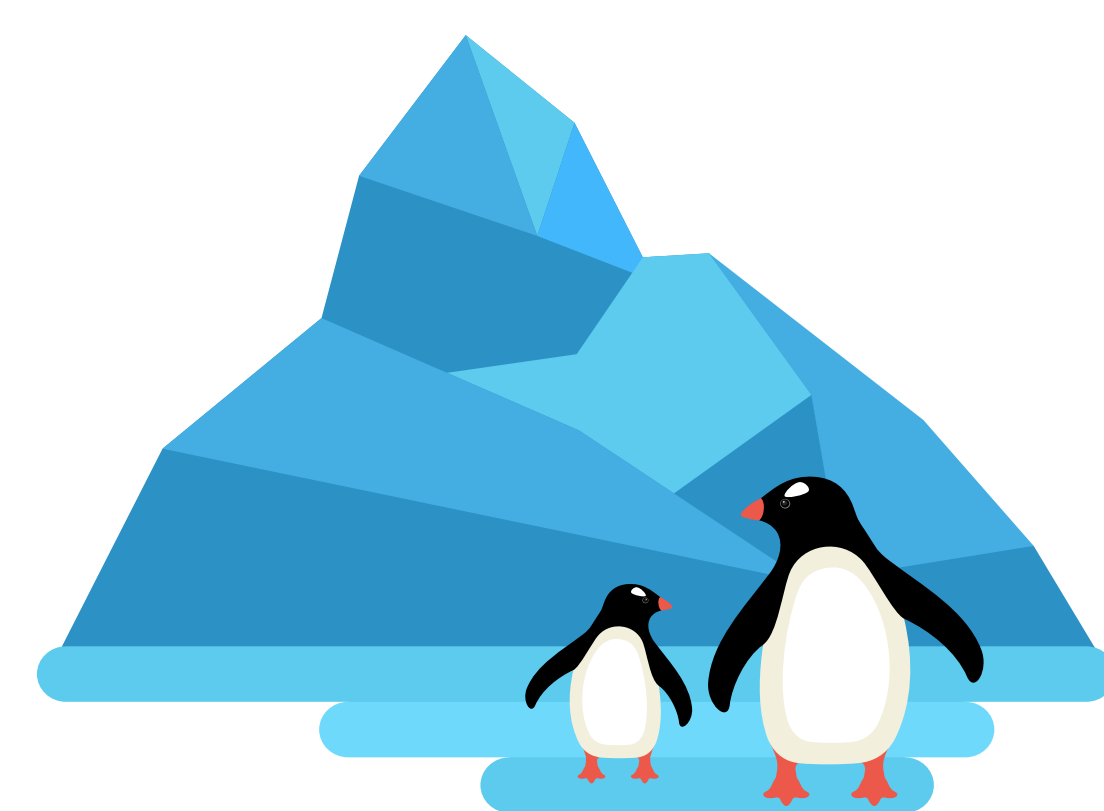
## SALTA

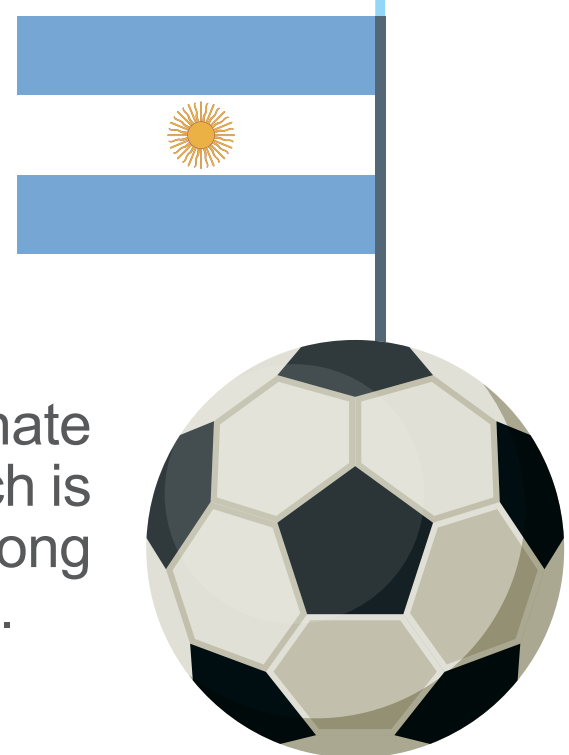


## TIERRA DEL FUEGO

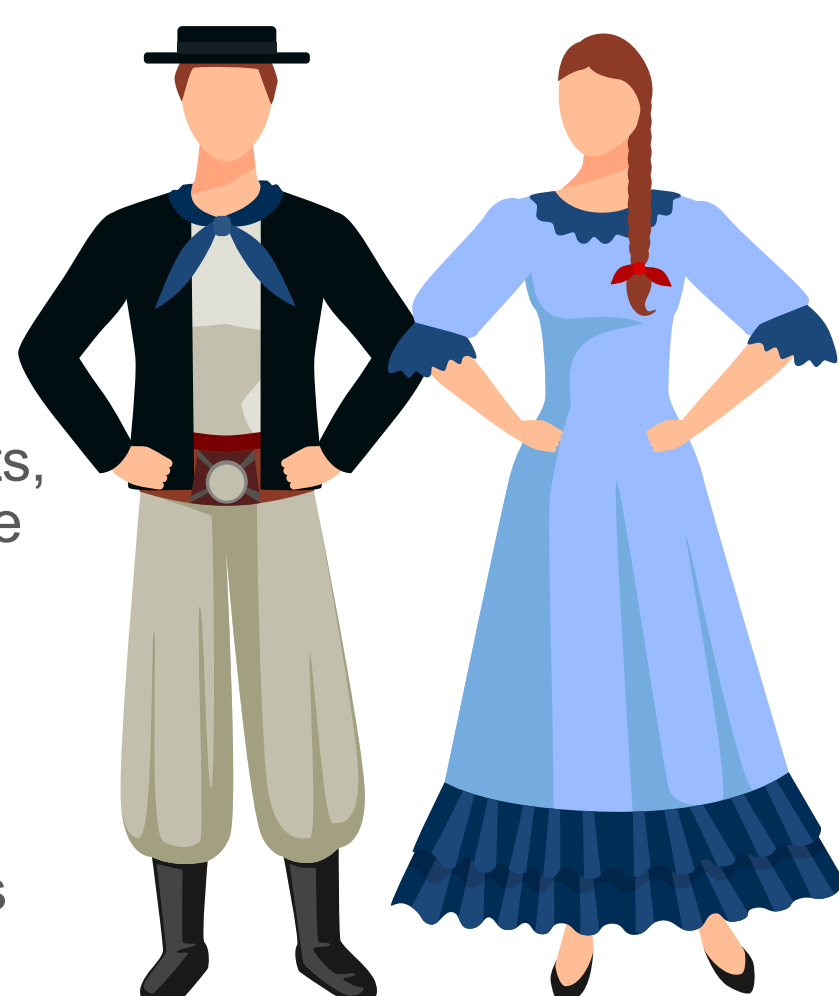
## CARNIVAL IN ARGENTINA

## TRADITIONAL ATTIRE

Highlights include the passionate Tango of Buenos Aires, a deeply felt and hypnotic partner dance that emerged in the late 19th-century working-class neighborhoods of Buenos Aires and Montevideo. Recognized by UNESCO as Intangible Cultural Heritage, Tango captivates with its close embrace, improvisational flair, and profoundly emotional connection, embodying the passion and soul of Argentine culture. Also, the lively Chacarera, the elegant Zamba from the north, the playful Gato, and the energetic, foot-stomping Malambo of the Pampas, each reflect regional traditions, indigenous roots, and European influences.
