THE BEST TIME TO VISIT

Morocco enjoys a varied climate shaped by the Atlantic Ocean, the Mediterranean Sea, and the Sahara. Coastal cities tend to be mild and breezy, while interior regions can be warmer and drier, especially in summer. The mountains bring cooler air and winter snow in higher elevations. 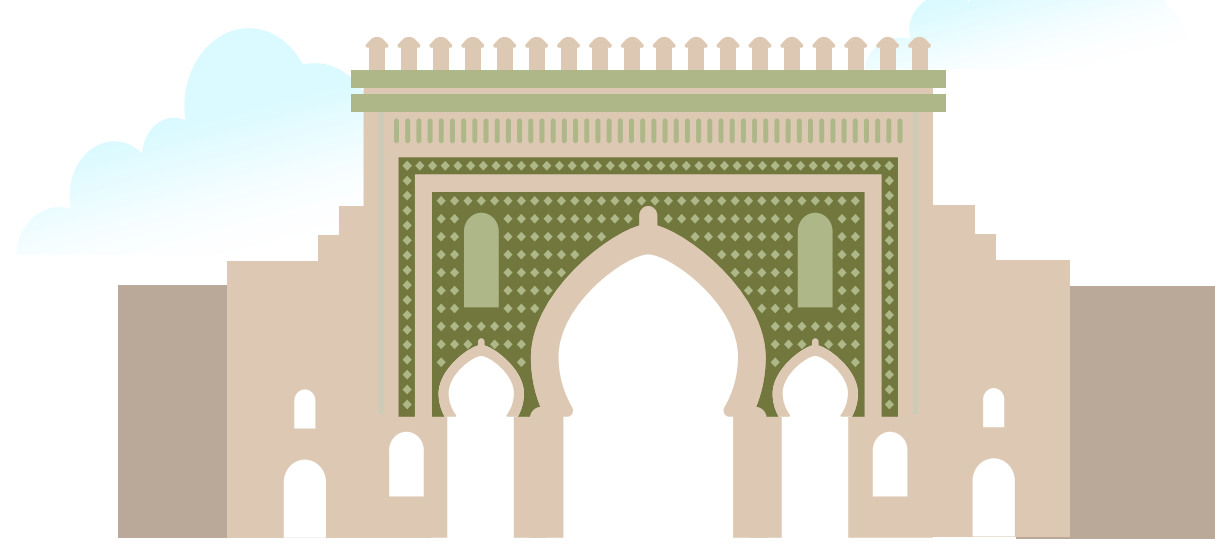
TRADITIONAL ATTIRE

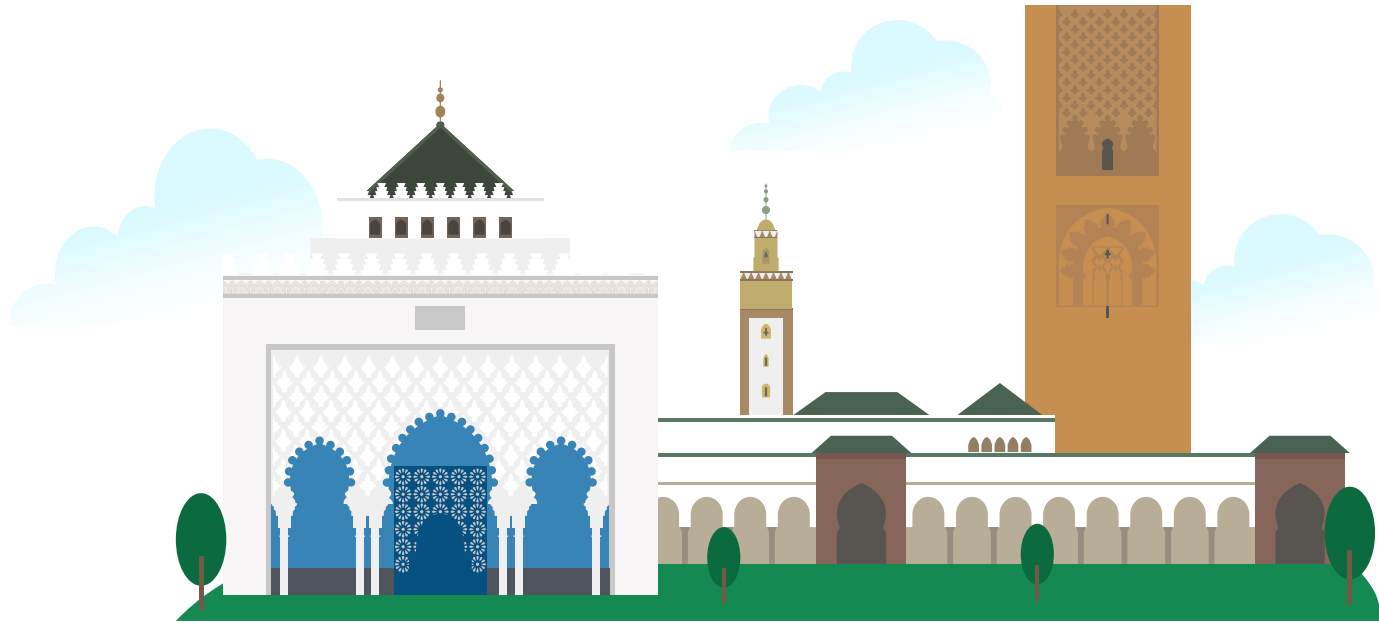
FEZ

Home to Amazigh ("free people" or "Noble people") villages, the Atlas Mountains offer travelers a glimpse into traditional mountain life, stunning natural landscapes, and a cooler climate compared with Morocco's lowlands and deserts.
