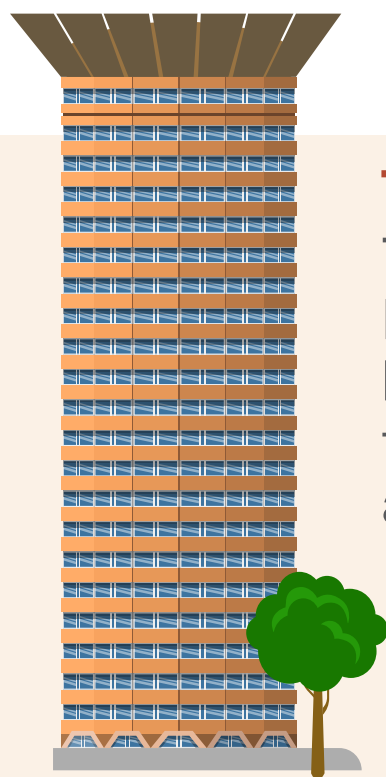

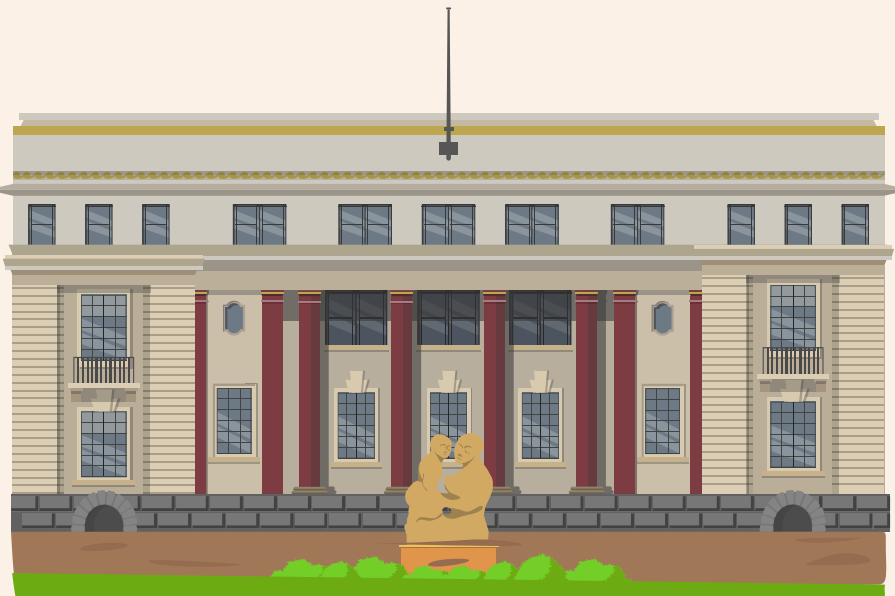


THE KENYATTA

The Kenyatta International Convention Centre (KICC), situated in Nairobi's City Square, serves as a landmark venue and an important hub for government activity. It houses several key offices, including those of recently elected Senators, making it both a political and administrative focal point in the capital.

FOLK DANCING

In Western Kenya, a distinctive traditional dance known as Sikuti is performed, named after the local drum central to its rhythm. This highly energetic dance is typically presented by pairs of male and female dancers, accompanied by a lively ensemble of drums, bells, long horns, and whistles, creating a vibrant and captivating performance.



NAIROBI NATIONAL MUSEUM

The Museum is designed around three core pillars of Kenya's heritage: nature, culture, and history. It serves as a one-stop destination where visitors can explore the country's rich legacy, offering both educational experiences and leisurely discovery in a single space.

CLOTHES

Although Kenya does not have an official national costume, traditional fabrics play a central role in everyday attire. The kitenge and the khanga are two of the most commonly worn garments across the country. Both are brightly colored, patterned pieces of cloth that serve multiple purposes, from casual daily wear to ceremonial dress, and are often chosen for their cultural symbolism as well as their style. They reflect the vibrancy, creativity, and diversity of Kenyan identity.



THE BEST TIME TO VISIT

The best time to visit Kenya depends on your interests. The long rains (April–May) and short rains (November–early December) bring lush scenery, fewer tourists, and excellent birdwatching, though some areas may be harder to access.



SAFARIS - THE ICONIC MASAI MARA

The iconic Masai Mara is often considered the crown jewel of Kenya's wildlife destinations, and with good reason. Visitors can enjoy a range of experiences, from thrilling game drives and guided safaris to unique bush meals in the wild. The reserve is home to an extraordinary variety of wildlife, including some of the country's largest recorded herds of zebra, rhino, and giraffe, making it a must-see for any safari enthusiast.



NAIROBI

the capital and largest city of Kenya, takes its name from the Maasai phrase Enkare Nyrobi, which translates to "cool water." Today, Nairobi stands as one of Africa's most dynamic cities, blending modern skyscrapers with rich cultural heritage. It is a major political, financial, and commercial hub, hosting international organizations, regional headquarters, and a thriving arts and culinary scene. MIJIKENDA HOUSE

A traditional Mijikenda house is distinguished by its hemispherical shape, built using locally available materials such as mud and straw. This design not only provides natural insulation, keeping the interior cool in hot weather and warm during cooler seasons, but also reflects the community's sustainable way of living. Beyond their practicality, these houses stand as enduring symbols of cultural identity and heritage for the Mijikenda people.
