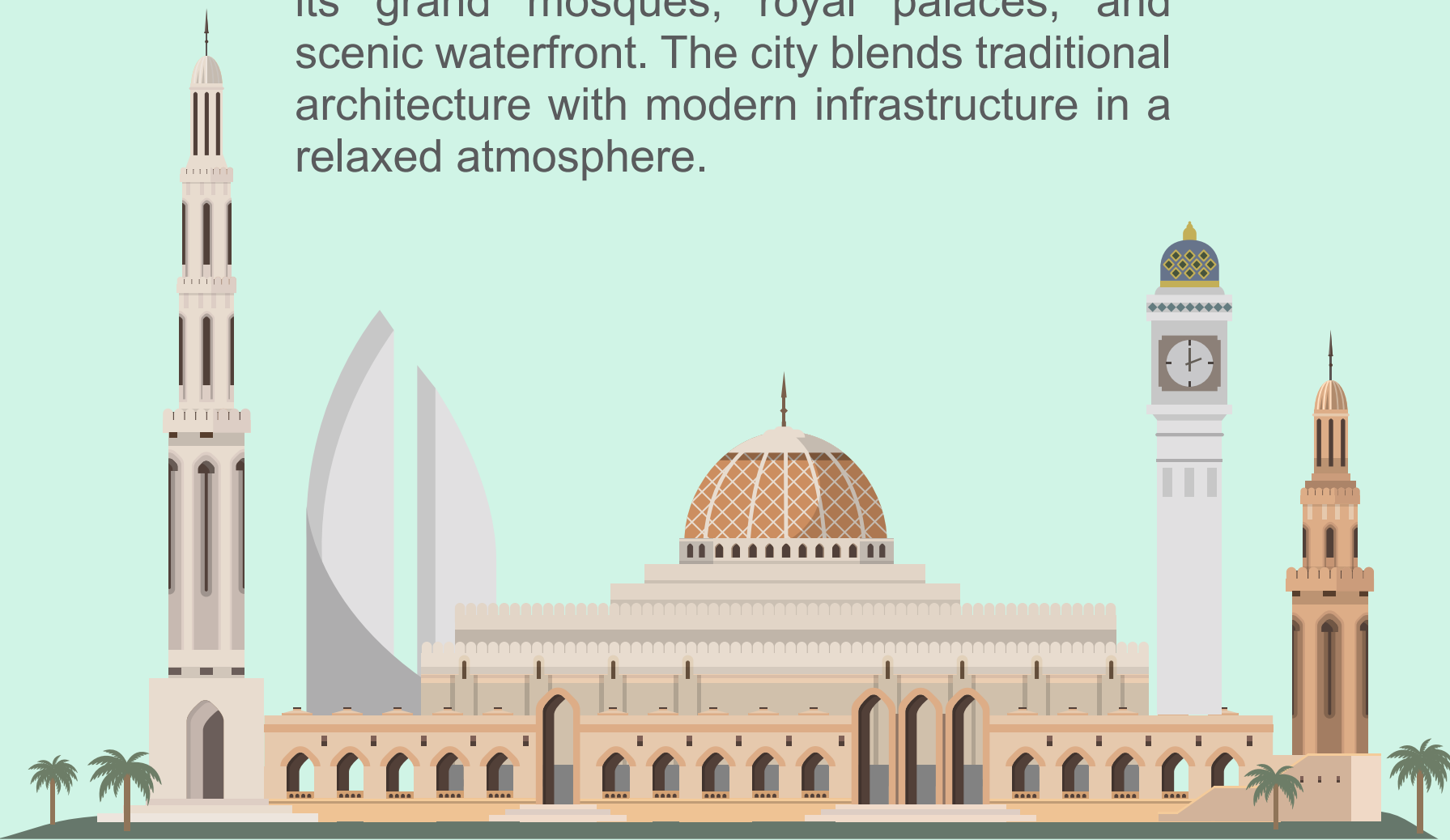

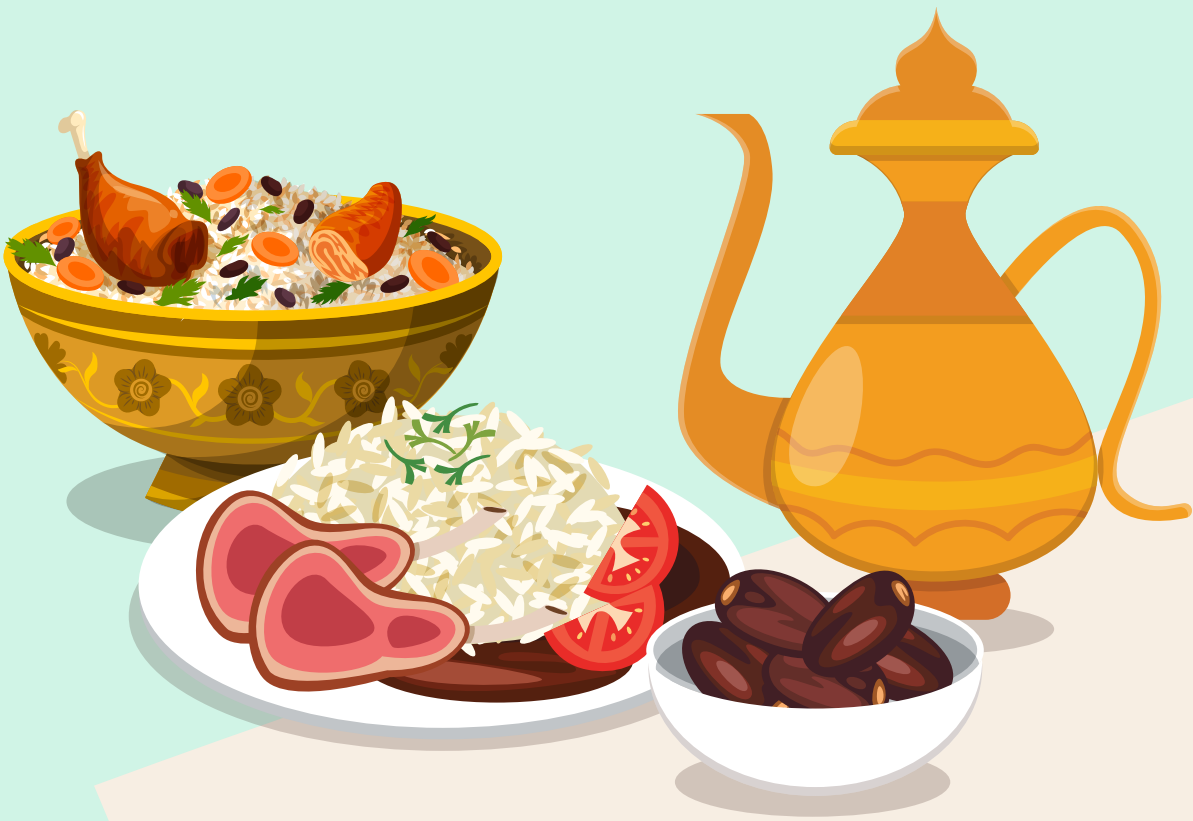


NIZWA
