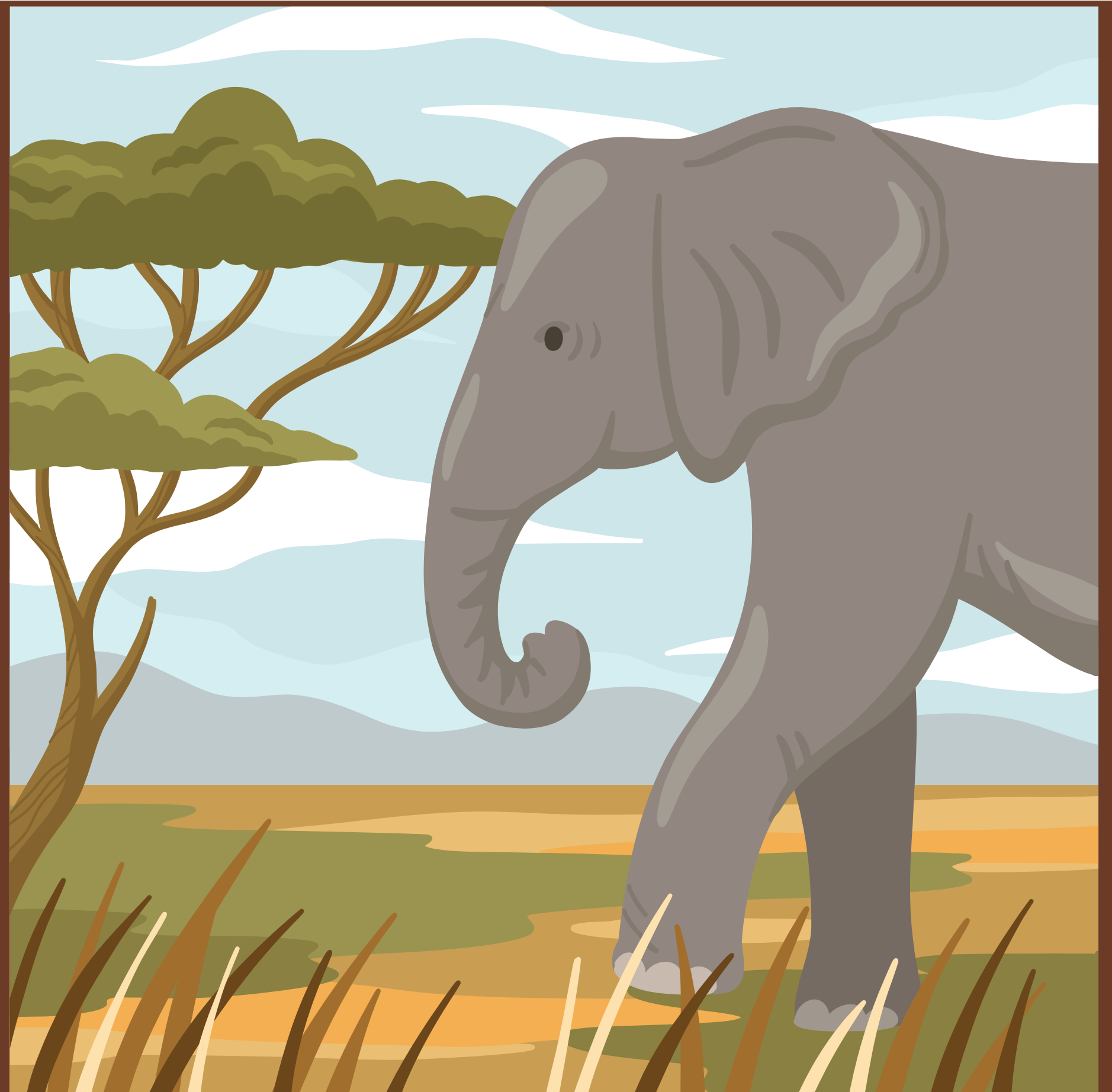




ZIMBABWE

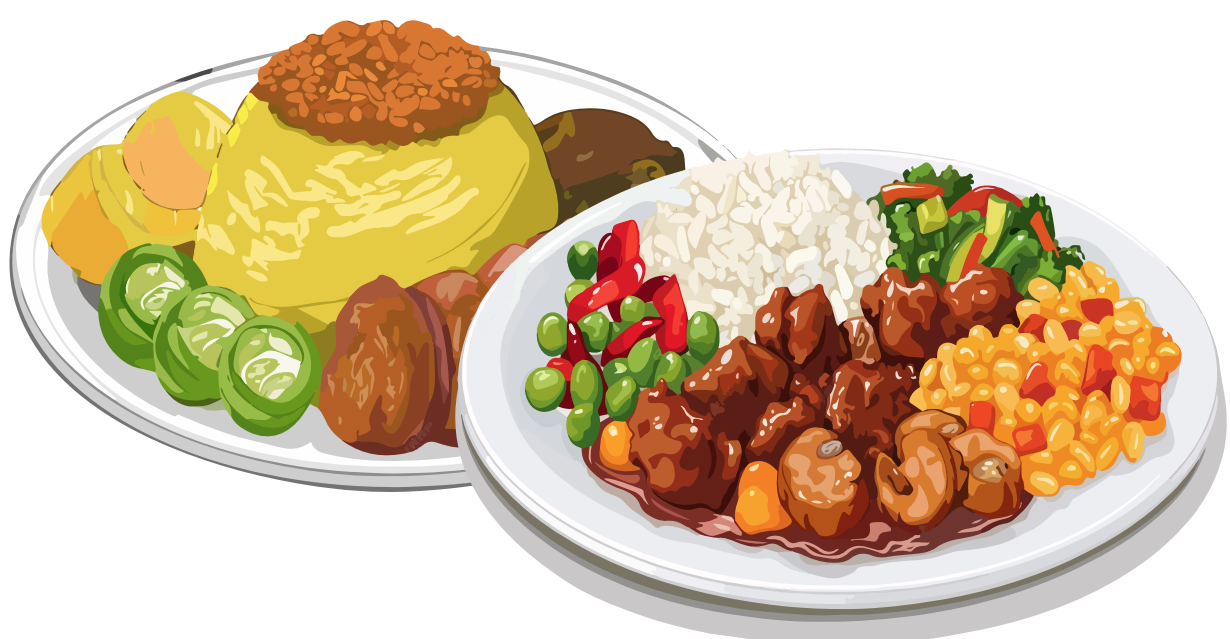
WEATHER

CUISINE & HOSPITALITY
The cuisine of Zimbabwe is hearty, simple, and based on local ingredients like maize, vegetables, and meat. A staple dish is sadza, a thick maize porridge served with sides such as stewed meat, leafy greens, or beans. Popular accompaniments include nyama (grilled or stewed meat, often beef or goat) and vegetables like covó (kale) or pumpkin leaves. Other traditional foods include kapenta (small dried fish), dovi (a rich peanut butter stew), and mapopo candy (a sweet made from papaya). These dishes reflect the country's agricultural roots and are commonly enjoyed in both everyday meals and special gatherings.

MUSIC & DANCE
Music plays an essential role in ceremonies and celebrations, with traditional instruments such as the mbira used to communicate history and emotion.



TRADITIONAL ATTIRES
Traditional clothing in Zimbabwe is vibrant and culturally rich, often seen at festivals, weddings, and community events. Visitors will notice colorful African print fabrics worn as dresses, wrap skirts, shirts, and headscarves, along with more distinctive styles from groups like the Northern Ndebele people, known for their bold patterns and intricate beadwork, and the Shona people, whose attire is simpler but still meaningful. These garments are more than just clothing, they reflect heritage, identity, and social traditions, adding a unique cultural experience for travelers.
